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

Launch of Tracking (In) Justice


While vital grassroots efforts have been made to keep track of police violence, there is no national government or civil society body tracking police-involved deaths in Canada on a consistent basis. It is against this backdrop that on February 23, 2023, Tracking (In)Justice: A Law Enforcement and Data Transparency Project that tracks police-involved deaths and deaths in custody across Canada was launched. The project aims to provide access to data and analysis individuals. SO organizations and communities can collectively advocate, shape policy, and create accountability. Tracking (In)Justice collaborative with project interdisciplinary partners from the Data Justice and Criminology Lab of the Institute of Criminology and Criminal Justice at Carleton University, the Canadian Civil Liberties Association, the Ethics and Technology Lab at Queen's University, and The CRIB at the Factor-Inwentash Faculty of Social Work, University of Toronto. Here are a few startling facts from the **Tracking (In)Justice** data, February 2023:

- Since 2000, 704 people have died during police use of force encounters across Canada.
- Last year (in 2022), 69 people died from such interactions, setting a grim record as the highest number in the last 20 years.
- On average, 22.7 people died in association with a police use of force encounter between 2000 2010. In comparison, from 2011-2022, an average of 37.8 people died each year. This represents a 66.5 percent increase.
- There are persistent racial disparities. Black and Indigenous people comprise around 8.7% of the Canadian population but account for 27.2% of police-involved shooting deaths.

Listening to their stories often helps to give one a deeper level of understanding and appreciation not only for the hardship they often have to endure, but also for the important role grassroots organizations play in their respective communities," said Dr. Roach.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: MEET OUR NEW TEAM MEMBER

Dr. Thabani Nyoni combines eight years in frontline community practice and social justice advocacy in Zimbabwe with six years of global research experience. Broadly, his research seeks to evaluate or inform the development of programs and policies that promote health equity and mental and sexual health outcomes among African, Caribbean, Black (ACB) and racialized populations facing multiple intersections of marginalization.

Dr. Nyoni's doctoral dissertation used social support theory to examine the role of HIV-related stressors and psychosocial resources as risk and protective factors for mental health and HIV treatment adherence outcomes of



Black adolescents living with perinatal HIV in South Africa. During his postdoctoral fellowship, Dr. Nyoni will conduct community-based research using qualitative, quantitative, and mixed methods to explore how contextual stressors embedded in multiple forms of marginalization individually and collectively produce distinct sexual and mental health experiences and outcomes among ACB and racialized populations.



CRIB Faculty Affiliates Professors Charmaine Williams & Njoki Wane Speak at Black History Month Symposium


Dean. Professor Charmaine Williams FIFSW Professor and Chair of the Department of Social Justice Education at OISE Njoki Wane provided opening remarks at last month's Black History Symposium entitled, "What Has Changed: The Role of Attitudinal Barriers to Advancing Black Inclusion". Hosted by the Anti-Racism and Cultural Diversity Office (ARCDO), the event sought to (1) understand attitudinal barriers that manifest in current and historical perceptions about Blackness and Black communities; (2) identify and discuss the role of post-secondary environments and attitudinal barriers that impact efforts to address systemic anti-Black racism; and (3) identify and discuss the strategies, tools and resources to strengthen advocacy and EDI transformation efforts to address intersectional forms of anti-Black racism in postsecondary environments.

C. Shawn McGuffey Returning to Transylvania University as Kenan Distinguished Visiting Professor
